What is foster care?

Over 64,000 children live with foster carers in the UK. There are lots of reasons why children may not be able to live with their own family. When this happens children move to foster care to make sure they are looked after and kept safe. Whatever the reason for you being in foster care, it is not your fault and not because of anything you have done.

What about what I want?

Your wishes and feeling are very important. Make sure you tell your social worker or foster carer what you would like to happen and how you are feeling.

What is a foster family?

Foster Families have been carefully chosen to look after children. They do all the things that birth parents should do, such as keeping you safe, making sure you eat healthily, setting rules and helping you with things like going to school and attending health checks.



How will I be looked after in my foster home?

There are certain ways you should be treated no matter what; these are called your 'rights':

- You have the right to be safe, secure and protected
- You have the right for adults to listen to you and treat you fairly and equally
- You have the right to information, advice, healthcare and an education
- You have the right to enjoy your religion and culture
- You have the right to any help you need with a disability



What will my Foster Family expect from me?

Every family has rules. These are about how to treat each other, about listening to each other and keeping everyone in the home



safe and well cared for.

Please speak to your foster carer or social worker if you are unhappy about anything in your foster family.



Who decides what will happen?

When you first move into foster care all the grown-ups in your life will get together and make a care plan for you. It is really important that you say what you want to happen and how you are feeling at this meeting. You may be asked to write this down or to tell your social worker and you may also take part in the meeting.



These meetings are called 'reviews'. They are held regularly to make sure you are being well cared and have the help and support you need while you are in foster care. At every review, you should be asked what you think and what your views are.

If you have any worries in between these meetings, you can talk to your social worker or the person who is in charge of the review. This is the Independent Reviewing Officer (IRO). Ask your social worker or foster carer for your IRO's telephone number.



What does my social worker do?

Social workers are people who enjoy working with children and are specially trained. It is your social worker's job to make sure you are looked after properly. They should visit you regularly and talk to you about what is happening in your life. They care about you and it is really important that you tell them if there is anything that you are worried about or need help with.



What does the supervising social worker do?

Every foster family has their own social worker and they are called supervising social workers. It is their job to make sure your foster family are looking after you properly and have all the support you both need. They will visit your foster family at least once every month and will talk to you from time to time to make sure you are happy and well cared for.

What about school?

School is very important because it's where you make friends, learn about things, start to grow up and take part in activities and hobbies that interest you.

Your teacher will know that you have gone to live with a foster family, but it is your choice if you want to tell other people. If you have any problems, difficulties or are being bullied, you must tell your teacher, social worker or foster carer.

If you are already at school, your social worker will try to work out if it is best for you to move to a new school or stay at your old one. They will ask you how you feel about this so it is really important that you share your thoughts.



Will I see my family?

We understand how important your family is to you. Your social worker will speak with you about when you can see your family and how often. Tell them who you want to see so they can try and make sure this happens.



What if I have a problem or I am unhappy?

We know that it's not easy moving in with a new family and we will do all we can to help make sure you feel safe, happy and well cared for.
