What is a foster family?

Sharing your home with other children who are unable to live with their own family is not always easy. Living with someone that you don't know can be hard while you get to know them and they get to know you. Children who are unable to live with their own family often struggle with new rules and boundaries. They may struggle with their behaviour and may need extra help and support. They can also be lots of fun and it can be good having them to play with.

What is Foster Care?

Over 64,000 children and young people live with foster carers in the UK. There are lots of reasons why young people cannot live with their own family. When this happens they usually move to foster care to make sure they are looked after and kept safe.

You can also talk to Ofsted who are in charge of all Fostering Services and follow up all complaints

What about what I want?

Your wishes and feeling are very important. Make sure you tell your parents or supervising social worker what you would like to happen and how you are feeling.

What is a foster family?

Foster Families have been carefully chosen to look after children. They do all the things that birth parents should do, such as keeping them safe, making sure they eat healthily, setting rules, providing lots of activities and helping with things like going to school and attending health checks.

How will another child be looked after in my home?

There are certain ways every child should be treated no matter what; these are called 'rights':

All children have the right

- to be safe, secure and protected
- to be listened to and treated fairly and equally
- to information/advice, healthcare and education
- to enjoy their religion and culture
- to have help with any disability they may have





Who decides what will happen?

When a young person first moves into your family home a meeting will be held to make a plan. Sometimes children only stay for a day or two and sometimes they stay for much longer and can even stay until they become adults and move into their own place.

What does my family's social worker do?

Every foster family has their own social worker, they are called supervising social workers. It is their job to provide support and guidance to ensure they are looking after all the young people in the home, including you! They provide support for all the family when it is needed. They will visit your home at least once a month and will want to meet with you from time to time to make sure you are happy and well cared for. You can also contact them if you need additional support at any time.

What will be expected from me?

A lot!

Having another child or young person come to live with you will change your way of life. Although your parent/s will be responsible for the children who come to stay you will be involved in helping to make them feel comfortable in your home.

You may find it very difficult at times. Try to remember that it is very difficult for the child or young person too. They are away from their home, family and friends. You can make as real difference; if you are friendly and kind this will help them feel welcomed.

Being part of a foster family can also be a lot of fun. You will get to meet lots of new people. Family Fostering arranges lots of fun activities for you and your family.
